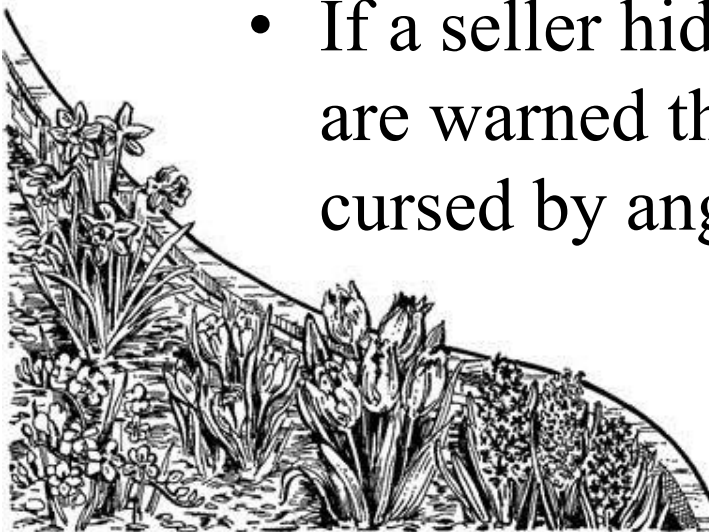
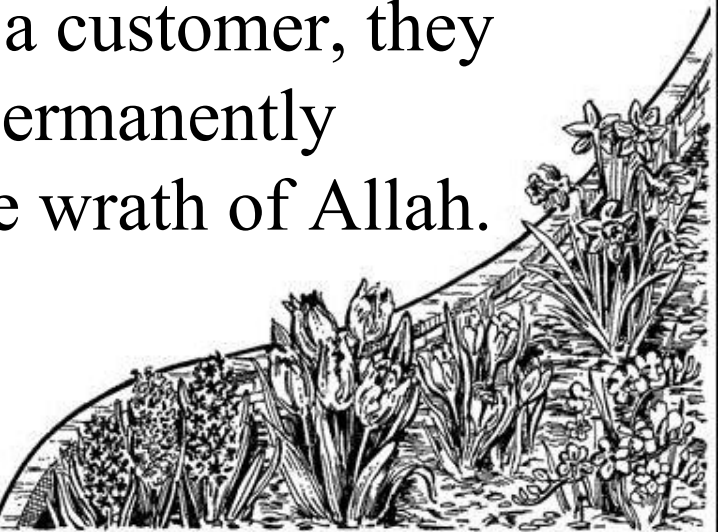


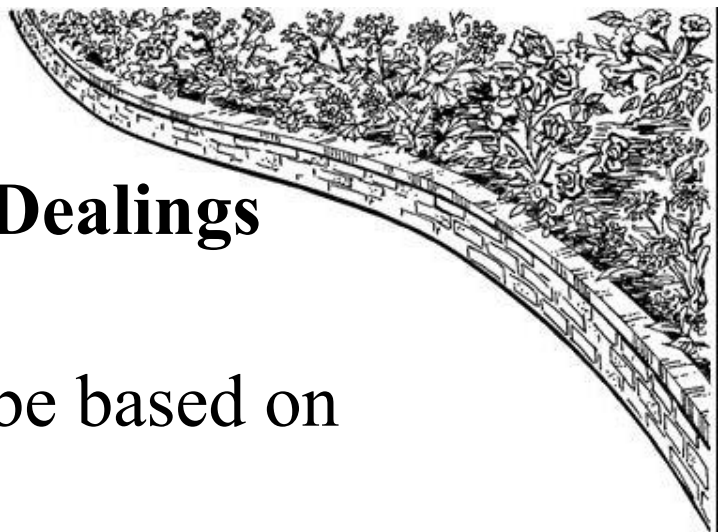
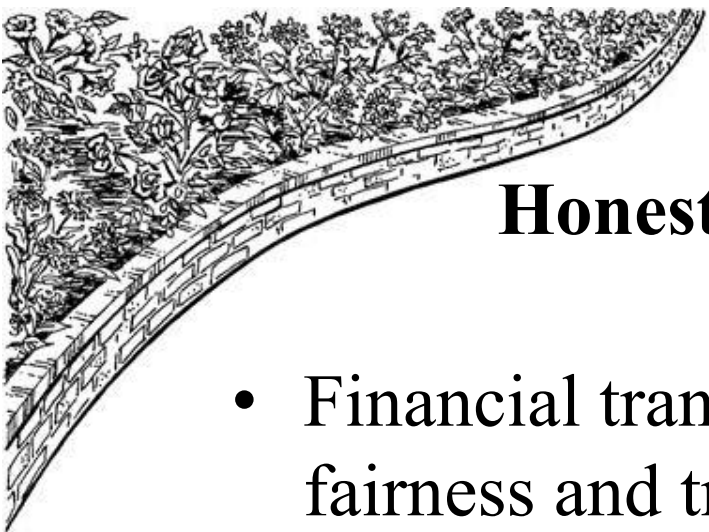
Honesty and Trade

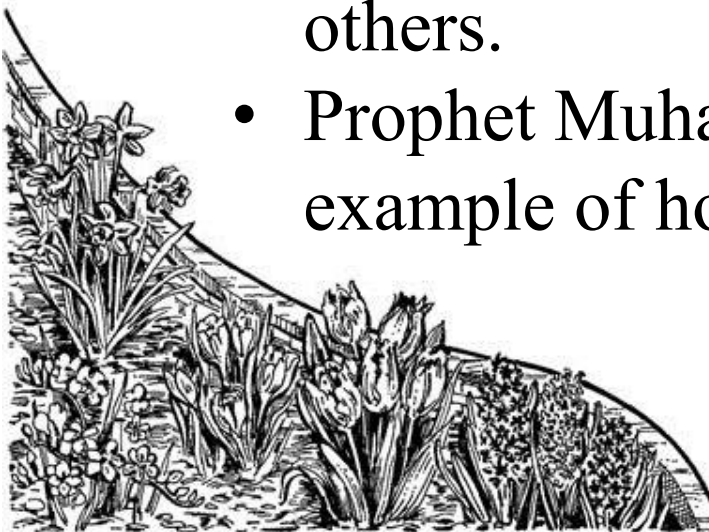


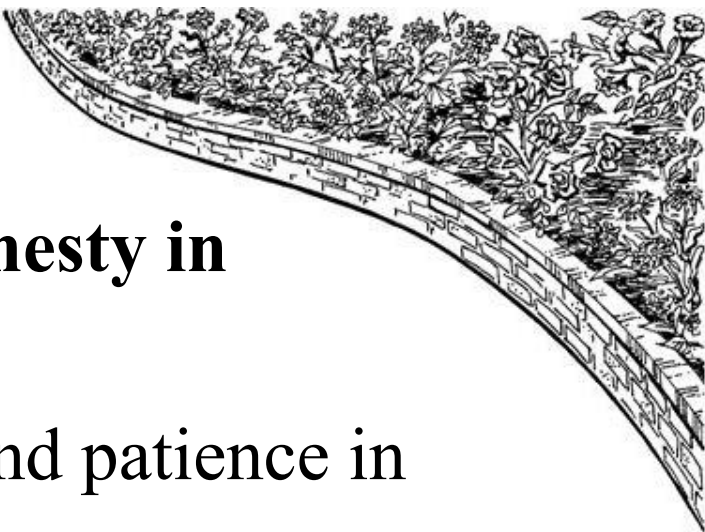
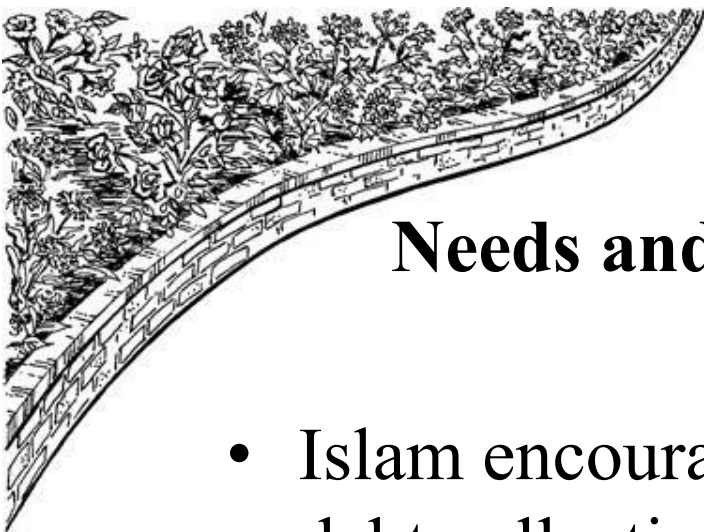
Honesty and Trade

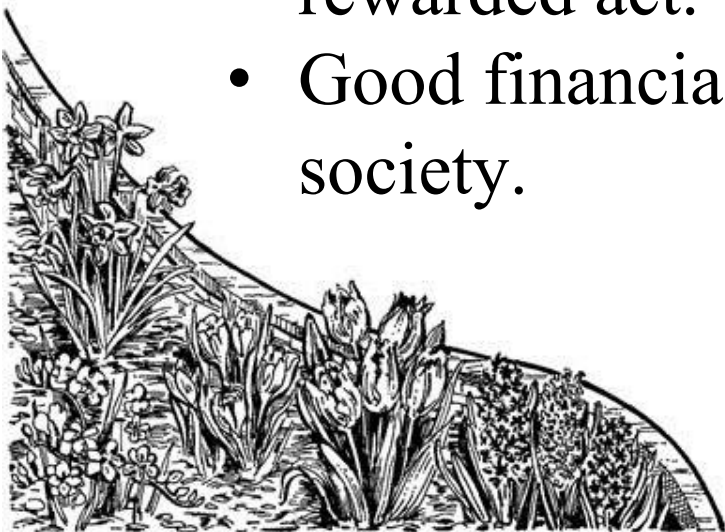


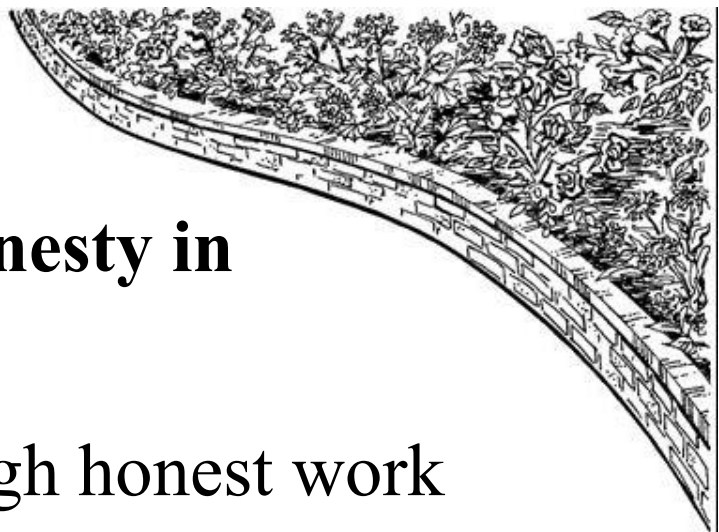
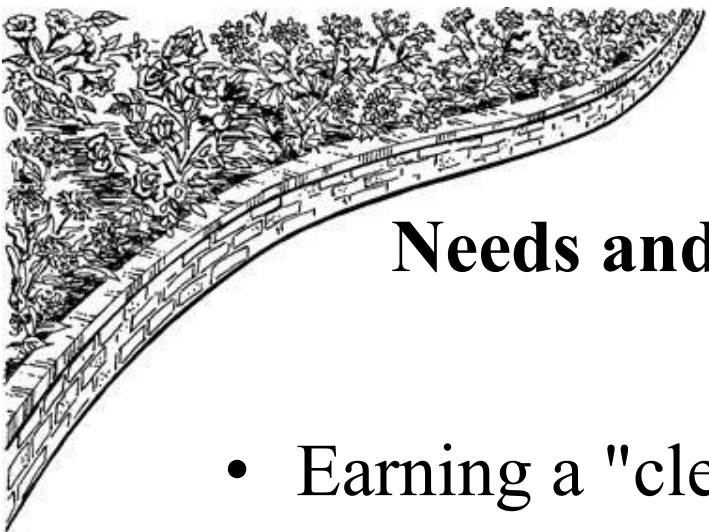
Honesty in Monetary Dealings

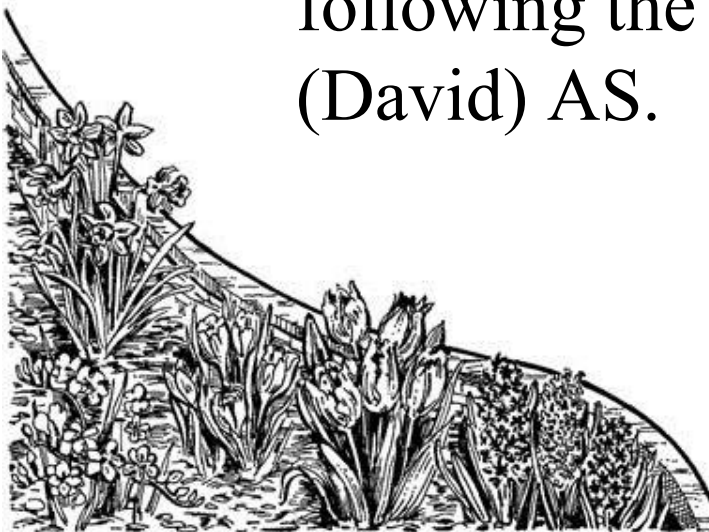
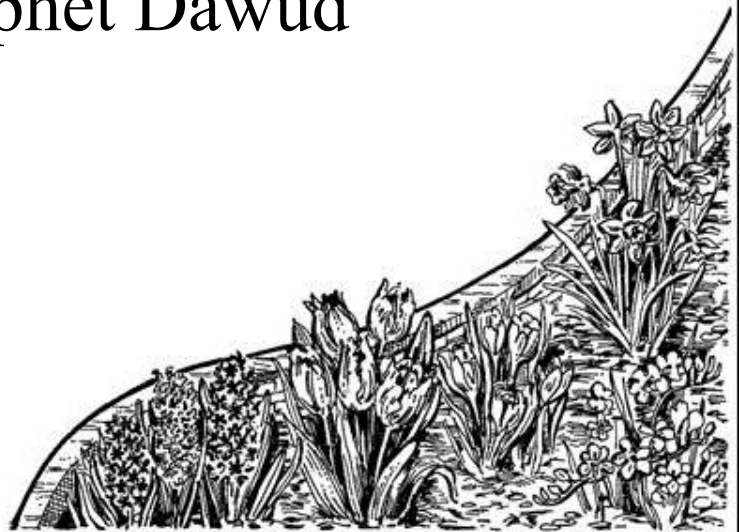


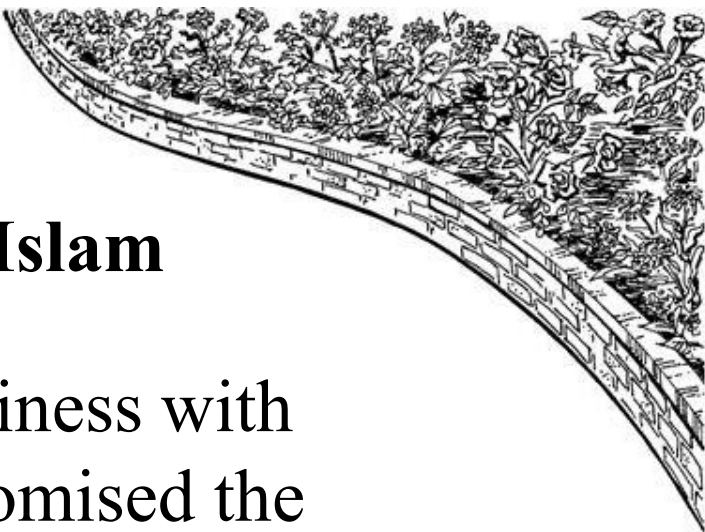
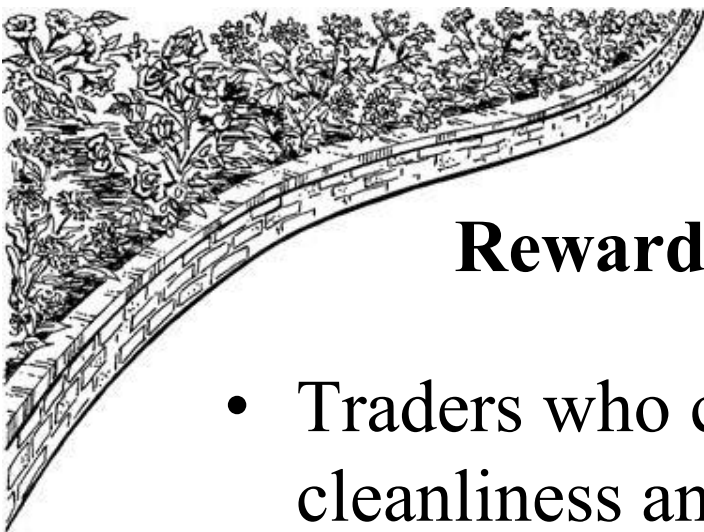
Needs and Benefits of Honesty in Islam
