4. **Influence on Individuals and Society:** Families influence personal habits, while governments shape societal policies. For example, environmental policies influence recycling and eco-consciousness at individual levels.



Types of Social Institutions

1. **Family:** Can be nuclear (parents and children) or extended (including other relatives). For example, joint families in South Asia play a vital role in supporting members emotionally and financially.
 2. **Education:** Includes formal setups like schools, and informal ones like apprenticeships. A scholarship program such as Fulbright broadens access to education globally.
 3. **Religion:** Religious institutions like mosques, churches, temples, and synagogues provide spiritual support, hold rituals, and engage in charity work, such as feeding the poor.
 4. **Government:** Examples include democratic institutions like parliaments or authoritarian systems like monarchies. Each type works to establish laws and deliver justice.
 5. **Economy:** Encompasses markets, banks, and corporations. For instance, the stock market represents the economic interactions of businesses and investors.
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Functions of Social Institutions

1. Socialization: Families teach children how to interact respectfully, while schools teach teamwork. Scouts and Guides programs are a formal example of teaching life skills.
2. Stability: Government institutions like the police ensure societal stability by enforcing laws. For example, traffic laws create predictability on the roads.
3. Integration: Religion unites diverse people, as seen in global gatherings like the Hajj pilgrimage in Islam.
4. Adaptation: The economy's adaptation to digital technology, such as online banking, is a modern example of institutions evolving with societal changes.



Interdependence of Social Institutions

How They Work Together: For instance, the family depends on schools to educate children, while education needs funding from government policies.

Impact of One on Others: A failing economy impacts family well-being and access to education.

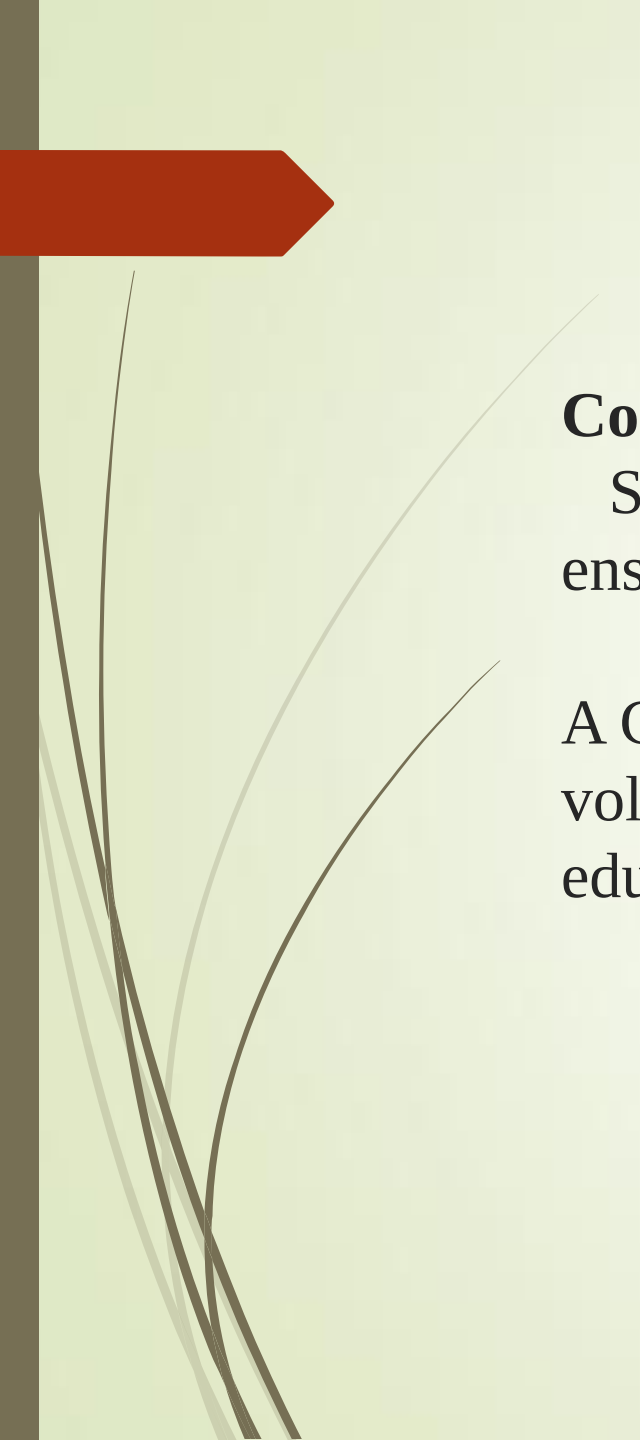
